SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The past year has seen some changes and challenges for the Board of Selectmen. First, we would like to thank Mr. James (Jim) Stewart for his four years of service on the Board. With his leadership we were able to restructure much of our compensation pay grades, negotiate the Police Union contract and update our Personnel Policy. Last March, Mr. Sean Murphy was elected to the Board. We welcome him and enjoy working with him. Effective 01/01/12, Sean will take over the Chairmanship of the Board.

The Recycle and Waste Disposal Committee worked very hard to produce new Request for Proposals (RFP) for our curbside pick-up of recycling and waste. This resulted in a substantial savings to the Town.

The Meeting House exterior has been completed. It took some years to allow the old paint to be removed without damage to the siding. The building looks better than I can remember. We would like to thank our Liaison Priscilla Lindquist for all of her work on the Historic District Commission.

The Fire Department took possession of a new Quint Fire Truck that was delivered last Spring and replaced a number of our older vehicles. The Department's Staff and Officers under the leadership of Chief Michael Carrier is serving the town well indeed!

The biggest challenge we have as a town is our Police Station. The building was built in 1941 as a Fire Station, largely with volunteer labor, to house our fire trucks. Its conversion 25 years ago to the Town's first Police Station worked for a while but has been inadequate for many years now. This year a new Building Committee started from scratch and has new plans, at a reduced cost, to present at Town Meeting. We ask that you take some time to inform yourself and participate in the vote. The majority of voters, even in these hard times, have supported the new station but we have failed to reach the 60% required for a bond issue.

The dramatic event of the year happened when one of our youngsters wandered away from home. While we know this community cares about one another, the turn out of concerned persons and search teams from all over the area was nothing less than overwhelming. Thankfully this turned out not to be a tragedy and we did learn from it.

The Board of Selectmen wish to thank all members of our Town Boards, Committees and Commissions for their service to the community. Without the tireless service of these individuals, Hampstead would not be the great place it is. The door is open to all residents. Please feel free to come and help.

In closing, the Board would like to remind voters that the Town Elections (Budget & Special Articles) will be Tuesday, March 13th, 2012, at the Hampstead Middle School from 8 AM to 8 PM.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Town of Hampstead, New Hampshire (the Town) as of and for the year ended December 31, 2010, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the Town's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the Town's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be deficiencies, significant deficiencies, or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

ASSESSOR'S REPORT

The firm of Municipal Resources, Inc. continues to handle the assessing functions for the Town of Hampstead. The primary members of the staff working in Town are, Scott Marsh, Michael Pelletier, Jerry Quintal and Joseph Lessard. It is requested that if any of the appraisers come to your property, you support the Town's efforts to keep assessments equitable and proper by answering questions and allowing them to inspect and measure your property.

Municipal Resources personnel are available to meet with taxpayers and if an appointment is desired, Dawn Shaw or Debbie Bryant in the Assessing Office can schedule one for you.

The roughly \$4,600,000 decrease in the 2011 taxable assessed valuation was a result of an update of mobile homes without land properties as well as corrections found during reviews. Both residential and commercial development remain at a relatively slow pace with roughly 300 properties needing review due to new building permits, taxpayer inquiries or properties which were not complete when they were last viewed. The Town is also continuing the process of physically reviewing and updating the recorded assessing data on 25% of the properties in Town.

The Department of Revenue Administration analysis of sale and assessment information indicates that the Town's assessment ratio for the 2011-tax year is 105.7%.

BUILDING DEPARTMENT REPORT

In the year 2011 we saw construction activity remain steady. New Hampshire's unemployment rate continues to be markedly better at 5.2% when compared to a national rate of 8.6%. I believe this has contributed to keeping construction activity steady when compared to years past. A total of 164 building permits were issued with a total construction dollar value of \$4,625,100. This represents a 23.50% increase in construction dollar value when compared to 2010. As 2012 is a presidential election year, we may very well see some significant changes in both fiscal and monetary policy at the federal level, intended to stimulate economic activity and construction spending.

In 2011 we have added 3 new residential units, 1 commercial building and 160 alterations, additions, demolitions and change of use permits. 20 septic systems have been replaced in the last year and 26 sign permits were issued to various locations around town. I have continued to see a lot of interest in regards to shore land redevelopment around our waterways. Two residential condominium subdivisions are continuing to be built. The names of the projects are Four Seasons Estates and Irongate Village. Look for a new veterinary clinic to open in mid-2012 at the corner of Route 111 and Hazel Drive.

Debra Bryant and Dawn Shaw both work as support staff for the Building Department and Assessors office for the regularly scheduled business hours. I serve as Chief Building Official in a full time capacity. Michael DiBartolomeo along with Robert Morache serve as assistant building inspectors. Anthony Iuele serves as our electrical inspector assisted by Michael DiBartolomeo. Michael Hartnett continues as our plumbing inspector and Winthrop Stubbs assists him. Will Warnock is our Fire Inspector. Once again, I would like to personally thank my employees who are part of a dedicated team constantly striving to make Hampstead a safer community.

CART

The Cooperative Alliance for Regional Transportation (CART) is a curb-to-curb transportation system serving the towns of Chester, Derry, Hampstead, Londonderry, Salem and Windham. Limited service to Plaistow is also available. CART is a shared ride service available to any residents of the six service towns, including seniors and other in the community who need transportation. Wheelchair lift-equipped vehicles are available to accommodate the needs of individuals with disabilities. As a public transportation service, CART keeps people on the move by offering **choice, freedom, mobility, opportunity** and a **better quality of life**.

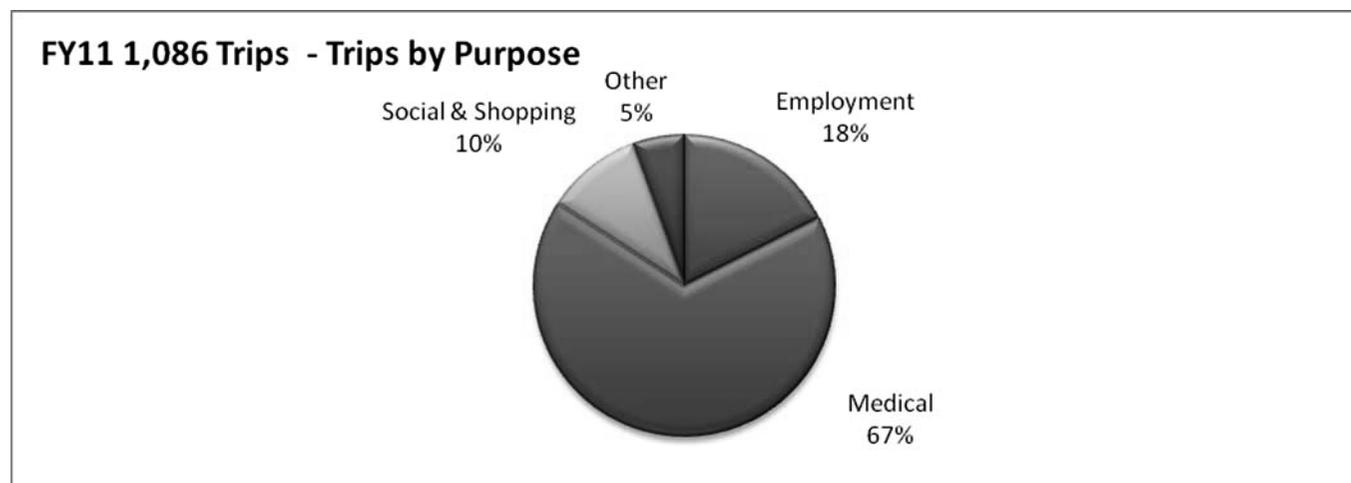
Who provides service for CART? CART works with multiple agencies in the six-town Greater Derry-Salem region to coordinate scheduling and dispatching of rides, pool resources to be more efficient and access federal transportation funds. The vans you see on the road will display a CART logo and also often the logo of one of the agencies that is a part of CART.

What kind of trips can I take with CART? There are a variety of times when a ride with CART can be helpful. CART service is available for medical appointments, shopping trips visits with friends or family, or any number of other reasons when you need a convenient safe ride.

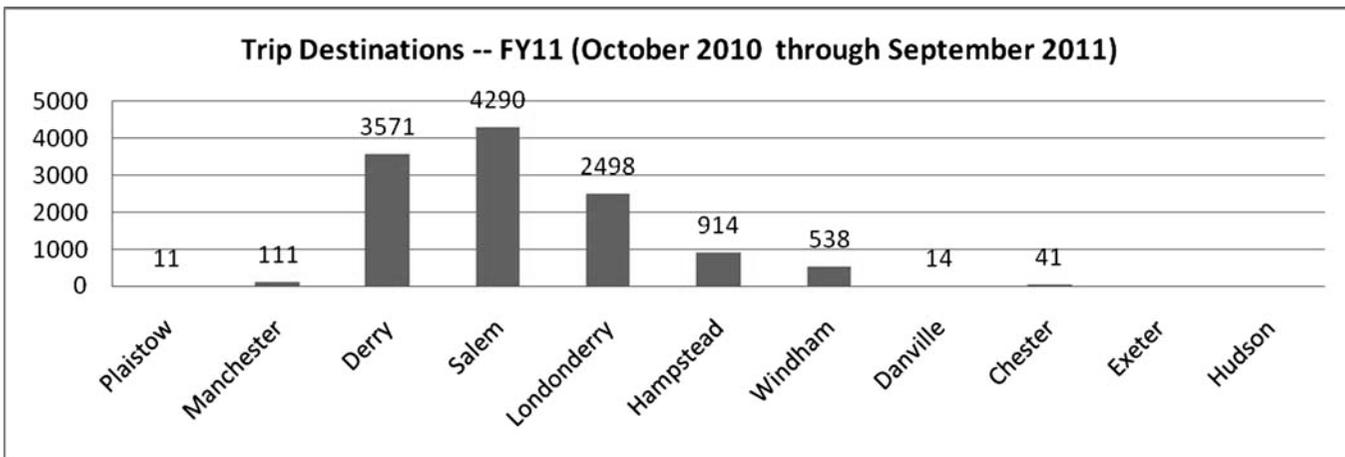
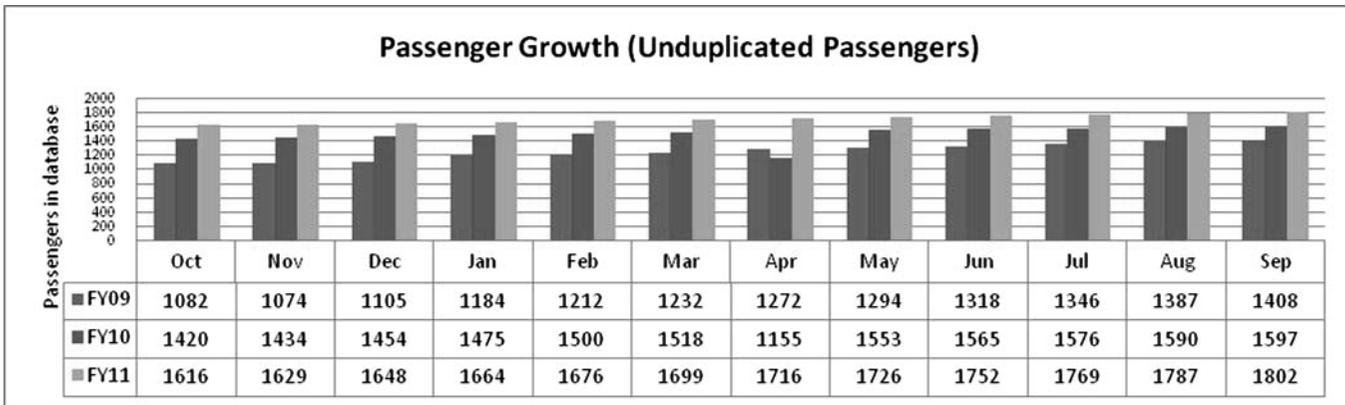
Who can use CART? CART is a shared-ride service that is available to any resident of the six service towns including seniors and others in the community who need transportation.

Where can I go on CART? CART goes to any destinations with our six town service area that include Chester, Derry, Hampstead, Londonderry, Salem and Windham. Limited service to **Plaistow** is available and service to out of region medical destinations in **Manchester, Exeter (new)** and **Hudson (new)** is available on certain days of the week.

Hampstead Activity for CART: The Town of Hampstead's cost share of for CART is \$ 17,142. Those funds are matched dollar for dollar by FTA funds. The total trips from October 2010 to September are 10,959 trips across contributing communities with a total of 1,086 trips being provided to Hampstead residents. The CART program began in 2006 and continues to grow in use. Given the economic conditions, the need for CART will grow as more elderly residents look for less costly means of mobility. The adjacent charts show Hampstead Trips, overall passenger growth, and trips that make Windham a destination.

CART's hours of operation run Monday through Friday 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. And passengers are asked to schedule their trip at least 24 hours in advance by contacting the CART call center at 603-434-3569. CART does not provide weekend or holiday service.

As CART moves into 2012 and will look toward maintaining a firm foundation for growth through improved service including a limited route deviation shuttle service connection to Londonderry, other innovative service modes, fleet expansion and better communication with passengers and the towns it serves.

HAMPSTEAD CONSERVATION COMMISSION - 2011 REPORT

This past spring was the cleanup of our large tree thinning project from the winter of 2010 and 2011. The process was first to clear all trails and fields of tree limbs and other forest debris. Second was the planting of over 700lbs of grass seed to stop erosion and to bring back our newly opened fields after clearing. Third was the construction of several sites to modernize drainage and gate systems. Most of our objectives were completed by June due to the extremely wet year. The project of thinning the forest was by all accounts a great success. Our Regional UNH Forester reviewed our results and gave us a resounding good grade for managing our assets correctly. The second part of our thinning objective was to open our fields back up to attract rare ornithology and other wild species. This will take longer to see our results but some of the more common birds have been sited using our property. Replanting the grass lands was an immediately obvious success due to the wet spring but there are still some open spots which need seeding this spring. The old drainage pipes have been replaced and we invested in two new gate entrance fences.

We were very lucky to have the help of the Middle School Children this year. I would like to thank the Principal and all the Teachers who participated in this tree planting project. Our Town Forester came into help educate the students on forestry and brought several other professional foresters to help in the field trip later that day. The trip out to the West Rd. property was spent walking the property and planting several different types of trees. The students planted the trees and received lessons at the different tree planting sites. Approximately 70 trees were planted by the students.

Another project was the construction of a bridge by Eagle Scout William Conte and Troop 33. The bridge is located closer to the Stage Rd. entrance than West Rd. This bridge was very well designed and the Committee will continue to use this design in future bridge construction. Eagle Scout Matthew Tyson of Troop 98 built a trail from the old rail road bed to Ordway Park. We are very lucky to have the Boy Scouts help every year in projects throughout the trail system.

This past year has been a year of change and growth. To ensure we are providing the most appropriate services for the residents of the towns we have been reviewing our programs and approaches. We are excited about introducing some new ideas and programs to the local communities in the upcoming year.

In addition to the existing staff, the agency now has the added layer an executive director. The position of Executive Director was created to ensure that there was an individual at FMJS on a regular basis that is responsible for overseeing daily operations, screening clients to make certain FMJS is operating within the scope of practice for the agency, to refer clients to appropriate resources when their needs exceed the services we are qualified to provide, and to support staff in the event of challenging situations that may arise with clients.

Roclyn Porter joined the staff in September, 2010 bringing 10 years of clinical experience working with families, particularly families with children who are involved in the juvenile justice system in one form or another. This work has included working with schools, medical facilities, law enforcement, and state and local agencies. She is a licensed marriage and family therapist, and she has experience in working with families in conflict and parental discord.

FMJS continues to offer the same services that have historically been offered. We continue to provide tobacco and substance abuse education classes, anger management, community service placement, and family mediation.

In considering the future, we are also looking forward to expanding our programming to include parenting classes, as well as education for a broader range of ages around substance abuse and anger management.

The members of the Board of Directors want to thank you in advance for your continued support as we grow and further develop our services, and please know you can continue count on FMJS to continue to provide the familiar support and programming we have in the past.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

2011 has been a busy and productive year for the fire department. The department responded to one thousand one hundred sixty-two (1,062) emergency incidents. Additionally, department members participated in over one-thousand (1,000) hours of training, dedicated hundreds more hours in committee meetings, assisted with the development of additional operating guidelines, and provided significant input in maintaining a dedicated and professional fire department.

The Fire Prevention division provided approximately 300 inspections, which includes Places of Assembly, Child Care, Oil and Gas, Schools, and General Businesses.

The Fire Prevention division is the department's liaison to businesses and home owners for fire protection systems such as fire alarms and sprinkler systems, community fire education, woodstove installation, smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors, etc. This includes reviewing plans for code compliance.

Approximately 98% of Hampstead's commercial and public buildings have been inspected for compliance as required by the State of New Hampshire fire code.

The town has begun utilizing the 2009 Life Safety fire code as adopted by the State of New Hampshire Legislature, as recommended by the State Fire Marshal. Currently, we are utilizing the 2003 fire code. This should continue to provide fire and life safety codes that will keep our residents and visitors safe.

This past year, the department was fortunate to receive two grants totaling \$562,500.00. The first grant was for a vehicle exhaust removal system, which was installed and is providing a much healthier station environment for department members. In May of 2011, the department also took delivery of our second grant from FEMA, which was for a multi-purpose emergency vehicle called a Quint. I would like to thank the department's truck committee members, Captain Kerry Clark, Captain Will Warnock, Captain Chris Dane, Lt. Eric Lafrancis, Lt. Ed Clark, and Firefighter Richard Gerry, who were instrumental in assisting me with making the best decision relative to providing the town a cost-effective vehicle.

For 2012, the department has applied for more grant money, totaling \$384,100.00. The department has asked for grant assistance for a replacement water tanker truck that will carry 3,000 gallons of water, a rapid response water rescue craft, rescue tools (Jaws of Life), and a sprinkler system for the fire station. If the department is fortunate enough to receive the grant money, the town will be responsible for a 5% cost share. For this reason, the department is looking for voter approval, through a warrant article, to utilize the Capital Reserve Fund for this purpose.

In addition, the department is also looking for voter approval to utilize the Capital Reserve Fund to replace outdated communications equipment and to replace the department's cardiac monitor/defibrillator, which is over 10 years old.

Utilizing the Capital Reserve Fund for these purposes is consistent with the intent of the fund and therefore will have no tax impact.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

The department continues to maintain a cost-effective approach to providing a public safety service to the community. The Fire Department's proposed 2012 budget has increased less than 1% over the 2011 budget and is up less than 1/2% since 2009.

Department Operations and Emergency Response

Again, during the year there were many inquiries on how the department operates and responds to emergencies. I thought I would use this opportunity to explain the department's operations.

The Fire Department provides many services to the town that includes Fire Suppression, Rescue, Emergency Medical Service, Hazardous Material Mitigation, and Emergency Management Functions.

The department is comprised of five (5) full time personnel, inclusive of the Fire Chief, a part time Fire Inspector, a part time secretary, and thirty (30) Call Firefighters.

Headquarters, which is located at 17 Little's Lane, is staffed with two (2) Firefighters on duty from the hours of 6:00 AM to 6:00 PM, seven (7) days a week.

During the evening hours after 6:00 PM, Call Firefighters, as assigned companies, respond to the station from their homes or other locations to get the appropriate emergency vehicles and respond accordingly.

The Call Department is comprised of four (4) companies. Each company has a Lieutenant and 4-6 Firefighter/EMT's. The companies rotate every four (4) weeks with a Chief Officer in charge.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

January brought the Town of Hampstead three storms that took several days to clean up. Making sure that the town's residents and emergency crews can get to where they need to go becomes one of our top priorities during any major storm.

During February, we took the time to plow out all the fire hydrants around Hampstead and made sure that all of our roads were winged back so that there would be enough room for any additional snow storms. The Department also cleaned various catch basins to make sure there wouldn't be any blockage causing flooding in the roadways. Towards the end of February there was a wind storm that caused many downed trees and branches, almost a week was spent cleaning up the sides of roads and making sure they were passable.

The month of March was particularly busy for the personnel. We started cold patching some of the roads and also worked on requests for proposals. Department employees also attended a chain saw safety class held at the Town Office building. The Highway Department started meeting with the State of NH to go over the Johnson Pond dam and Wellington Road culvert projects.

April was the start of "spring cleaning". A culvert was fixed on Wheelwright Road and a sink hole on Veteran's Way was also repaired.

Around the middle of May, the Town bought a new brush chipper and the next couple of weeks were spent on chipping brush. The department also went to Brentwood to learn about a new form of cold patching. This new cold patch for the roads is made up of recycled roof shingles, which has been found to work well. The Road Agent also met with a contractor to discuss the roads in Hampstead that need to be rebuilt. A culvert located on James Drive was also fixed.

In June the swales on James Drive, Buttrick Road, as well as Valley Road were rebuilt to get ready for repaving. A contractor started grinding the roads of Valley, Kimberly, James, Baywood and part of Marilyn Park Drive. The Town Hall parking lot had gotten paved.

July was filled with more brush cutting around the town. The Town Hall parking lot was finished and the lines were painted. During the end of July, we replaced two culverts on Depot Road that would completely flood the road during any hard rain fall.

The new chipper that the town purchased has been a GREAT asset to the town. During mid August it was put back to use chipping up more brush around town. The Department also started some much needed road maintenance by crack sealing Kent Farm Road and Central Street. The Town was also faced with another wind storm that had downed a lot of branches.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The month of October was a busy one, besides the normal everyday maintenance around the town; we chipped more brush left over from the recent wind and rain storms. The highway department also assisted many other town officials and departments by searching for a missing child. We had decided to search all local culverts and catch basins located in the area of Brown Hill Road. The child was then found safe in a neighbor's house. There was great effort shown by everyone in the Town of Hampstead while searching for this child.

The end of October brought on an early winter for all of us. There were a lot of trees and brush covering many roadways in town as a result of the early snow. Once the snow was cleared off of the roads, we then started a vigorous two week clean up of chipping all the brush accumulated over the town. A tree company was hired to come in and cut down damaged trees that became a danger due to the storm, this was done in the first weeks of November. With the better weather in early winter the department was able to replace a culvert located on Wellington Road. A larger culvert was installed to handle the Johnson Pond run-off. Part of a culvert on Harper Ridge Road was also replaced that was starting to sink.



HUMAN SERVICES

Located on the second floor of Town Hall, the Hampstead Human Services Department has regularly scheduled office hours Tues 9-4 and Fri 9-12 noon. In order to be of better assistance to you, residents are encouraged to call ahead to schedule an appointment. Any resident with questions or concerns may also leave a confidential message at 329-4100 x114, which will be returned as soon as possible on Tuesdays or Fridays. In the event of an emergency/crisis situation, if unable to reach the Human Services Dept., please contact the Selectmen's Office during regularly scheduled Town Hall business hours.

Human Services' main purpose is to provide general financial assistance to residents who, for a variety of reasons, are experiencing difficulty meeting their own basic needs – i.e. shelter, food, heat, electricity and critical medical expenses. Typically town assistance helps to resolve an acute crisis, after which residents are generally able to return to self-sufficiency. Town intervention can range from assisting with electrical disconnects, fuel assistance, rent/mortgage payments to providing food or gas vouchers.

In addition to providing direct assistance in these areas, the Human Services Department is very active in providing referrals to other vital community agencies where additional services can be accessed. We work closely with NH Department of Health and Human Services, Rockingham County Community Action, Community Health Services, St. Anne's Food Pantry, Vic Geary Senior Center, Greater Derry Community Caregivers and CART.

Through these activities, it is our sincerest hope that the financial and informational support provided by the Human Services Department will be instrumental in helping our residents overcome occasional hardship and prosper in Hampstead.

And finally, on a personal note, I'd like to formally acknowledge my colleagues Sally Theriault and Tina Harrington as well as Audrey DeProspero, Administrative Assistant to the Plaistow Town Manager, who so graciously stepped in this summer to carry on the work of Hampstead Human Services during my extended leave. Without regard for the impact it would have on them, they always put me and our residents first. Their "can-do" spirit and camaraderie allowed me a peaceful recovery and unquestionably benefited Hampstead residents who sought assistance during this period. For this, I remain humbled and so very grateful.

HAMPSTEAD PUBLIC LIBRARY

The primary function of the Trustees of the Hampstead Public Library is to ensure provision of the highest quality library service in order to meet community needs. The Board of Trustees was established in 1888. It is governed by NH Law Chapter 202 and other pertinent statutes.

The Town of Hampstead, as all other state and local governmental units has faced a decline in revenues over the past couple of years. The New Hampshire State Library which provides many services to NH public libraries faced budget cuts as well. In light of the budget cuts the State Library will no longer provide free access to HeritageQuest database, the fee will be picked up by the Friends of the Hampstead Library. The State Library has also decreased van service to one time a week. In the past the van made book deliveries to the library twice a week to fulfill Inter- Library Loan needs.

We were sorry to lose Library Trustee Paul Schofield, who resigned midterm. Fortunately we were able to replace him with John Skidmore. Gwen Glick filled the Alternate Library Trustee position in November. The community also said goodbye to Library Director, Peggy Thrasher, when she left to take a position at another library. We will miss her flair for technology, talents and good nature. Merrily Samuels, the Assistant Director, filled in as Interim Director until Debra Hiatt was hired in November 2011. We also welcomed Library Assistant, Kate Thomas, in late August. Kate, an avid reader, filled a previously vacated position.

Youth Services Librarian, Patty Falconer, earned a Master's Degree in Library and Information Science. The library staff continued to participate in many professional development opportunities, attending conferences and Library Co-op meetings.

Facilities

As in any older building, a number of minor repairs and maintenance were addressed. Windows were replaced on the first floor, the server was replaced to accommodate user demands and remedy service outages, and the fire protection system was updated.

Services and Programs

According to statistics to be reported to the State Library for calendar year 2011 the total circulation was 71,883; directly to Hampstead Patrons and 1,878 indirectly through interlibrary loans. The total material collection was 47,694.

The Library was busy with established and new programs this year. Patty Falconer, the Youth Services Librarian, planned and implemented 224 programs including story times, the summer reading program and special events such as the stage production of "The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe", Holiday Book Buddies, Adult Storytimes. Ms. Falconer also received a \$2,000 grant from Target to implement a Books for Breakfast program. Children's events brought in 4,145 visitors to the Library this year.

HAMPSTEAD PUBLIC LIBRARY

Adult programs and events are planned and implemented by staff members and the Friends of the Library. Janet Arden brought 231 programs to the community including Spain: A Magical Mystery Tour, A Royal Reception, and A Social Media Seminar. There were 117 participants in the Adult Summer Reading Program. Nancy McMullen led the Needlework Socials and a program for Spinners & Knitters; Ann Myer planned and led monthly Adult Book Discussion groups. Adult programs brought in 2,916 attendees. The adult summer reading program is planned and implemented by Janet Arden with support from the Friends of the Hampstead Public Library. Assistant Director, Merrily Samuels provided book club kits to the 7 book clubs in Hampstead and mediated our inter-library loan services with the assistance of Ann Myers. Book and material displays are planned and implemented by each member of our library staff.

The Friends of the library sponsor the summer reading programs as well as programs for children and adults. They also offered 9 programs including “The 2012 Fraud: Misreading the Maya and Their Calendars”, Who Won the War of 1812?” and Rebecca Rule to the Rescue. The Friends Bi-Annual Auction at Zorvino Vineyards was a huge success, bringing in funds to support library programs, museum passes, and databases.

Appreciation is also extended to Sam Falconer for dedicating his time to offer computer tutoring to community members each Monday afternoon and for Harry Falconer who helped Sam teach the Technology Petting Zoo. The annual book sale in August is run by Merrily Samuels with assistance from a number of library volunteers. The volunteer program continues to provide much-needed support for Library operations. Thank you to our adult volunteers, Dan Cheetham and Marilyn Moran, who regularly volunteer to give over 413 hours to the library and student volunteers who gave over 242 hours to satisfy academic or community service needs.

The Friends of the Library continues to generously provide supplemental funding to improve the library’s collections. Specifically providing Ancestry.com, a genealogy database and museum passes. We thank them for their generosity.

We also wish to thank the following groups who support Library programs throughout the year: The Hampstead Mothers’ Club, Hampstead Civic Club, Lions Club, Hampstead Academy, Angle Pond Woods, and Big Island Pond. I extend sincere appreciation to the many people who have assisted the library in planning high –quality programs and events for Hampstead residents.

We look forward to providing excellent library services and programs for you in 2012. Please feel free to contact any member of the Board of Library Trustees with your comments.

ORDWAY PARK

2011 saw substantive progress in the long-range plan for Ordway Park. Thanks to last year's purchase by the Conservation Commission of the 3 acres between the park and the Rockingham Trail, Boy Scout Matthew Tyson stepped forward to build a trail through the newly-protected land as his Eagle Scout project. FORPARK appreciates his initiative, planning and work, as well as the oversight of the Conservation Commission and the support and contributions of the BSA Troop 98 project team. People quickly discovered the new woodland trail linking the park and the Rockingham Trail

FORPARK volunteers provided park maintenance and improvement work to coordinate with the new trail. The eastern opening in the park's Depot Rd. stone wall was improved and maintenance was done along the stone wall. Trees and brush were cleared, and storm damage cleaned up. An internal park stone wall was opened for access to the new trail, and rubble from past Depot Rd. maintenance work (which had been dumped over the stonewall into the park) was cleaned up and used to grade the access point for the new trail. Stone and topsoil stockpiled in the park's lower parking area was moved and spread to regrade the stonewall opening and connect to Depot Rd. This work creates easier work access for projects like the new trail; it also improves recreational access for people of all physical abilities.

Volunteers also graded material for the surface of the new parking area across Depot Rd. and installed a granite "PARKING" post to guide potential users. Some finish work remains, including the completion of a stone drainway for run-off from abutting properties, but the new parking area is available for use. This represents multi-year planning.

The long east-west walkway, dubbed "the promenade", was extended by volunteer work. Tree removal and storm damage work were donated, improving new use areas and benefiting remaining trees. Poison ivy treatment was donated, as was brush and path mowing. The committee contracted out stump grinding in key use areas so that maintenance and safety are enhanced. Also contracted was hydroseeding in the new lawn area, mulch delivery (and some spreading), some material trucking, and some storm cleanup after Tropical Storm Irene (from the Martha Ordway Park Trust).

In 2002, the committee reviewed plans for a 9-11-01 memorial. This year the committee worked with volunteers to realize this long-term vision. Called "Sacred Honor," the memorial installation included private donation of granite elements, a donated historic railroad marker, donated millstones and steel bases to create picnic tables, donated site materials (3/8" economy stone, processed gravel, sand/loam topsoil, stainless steel pin, epoxy, landscape fabric, Superphosphate). Friends of Ordway Park donated the granite engraving, sod purchase, bricks, refreshments, chair and table rentals, and daffodils and daffodil planting. Volunteers donated labor and equipment for grading, material spreading, tree and other site work, installation of all new elements, weed control, mowing, and sod laying. We appreciate the contributions made by Summit Signs, Susanne's Weddings, Ward Fabrication, Buddy Collins, Zack Nicolaisen, Carson Koenig, Rick Senter and David Forbes. A full report on "Sacred Honor" donations is in the works.

ORDWAY PARK

Thank you again to the Hampstead Garden Club. We appreciate your continued commitment to the central long garden and to Ellie's Garden as one of your town civic sites. People enjoy visiting the park to see your gardens in bloom throughout the entire growing season. Your new plant labels offer an opportunity for sharing your knowledge.

The committee expects to move forward again in 2012, working towards realizing more elements of the long-range plan for the park. The town website offers access to the Ordway Park Facility Use Agreement and to information about brick purchases and plant donations.

PLANNING BOARD

Residential and commercial construction continues to be depressed in Hampstead as well as throughout the area. Consequently the Planning Board is typically only meeting once a month, on the first Monday of the month. There is some commercial land available but we have seen no one is interested in developing it given the present economic situation in the country.

As we have previously reported, Hampstead has built on most of the developable residential land in town so the population should be stable for the foreseeable future with the present zoning. And while the school population is declining at the moment, it is possible that as the families in town evolve the school population will grow again in 15 to 20 years.

The Planning Board has submitted four changes to the Hampstead Zoning but these are minor in nature. They are made at the request of the Zoning Board of Appeals and the Code Enforcement Officer. The Planning Board had several hearings on these amendments and asks for your approval.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

As another year has closed out I would like again to thank the residents of Hampstead for letting me serve as your police chief. 2011 was another busy year for the department as our officers made 223 arrests of which 86 were felony cases, investigated 198 traffic accidents, 84 theft complaints, 21 burglaries, 6 sexual assaults, 33 assaults and 23 drug arrests to name a few. 226 criminal cases and 362 motor vehicle cases were prosecuted for our department in district court. Of the 1,387 traffic stops, 425 received traffic summonses and 962 received warnings.

The addition of the police motorcycle unit in 2011 appears to have been well received by the residents as the officers are now more interactive with the people in the neighborhoods and allows us easier access to areas not accessible by automobile. This increased presence, I believe, has contributed to the minimal amount of house burglaries and reports of vandalism from years past.

As always I wish to thank all of my officers and dispatchers for their dedication and hard work throughout the year keeping the residents of Hampstead safe. I also wish to extend my sincere thanks to all of those who assisted us this past October looking for a missing child. Their assistance with the help from our fire department, many additional outside law enforcement and fire agencies and civilians came out in our time of need.

I look forward to serving as your police chief in 2012 and would ask for your continued support of our department.

ANIMAL CONTROL DEPARTMENT

After working for the past 5 years as your Assistant Animal Control Officer, I felt very privileged and honored to follow in Dale Child's footsteps in accepting the position of Animal Control Officer (ACO).

In 2011, the ACO worked with the Hampstead Town Clerk's office to conduct an aggressive dog licensing campaign. We were able to license 1,484 dogs. Licensing dogs is required by state law and also enables the ACO to be more efficient in returning lost dogs to their owners promptly. Revenues generated from licensing and other related fines/fees are:

1. Dog Licensing	\$6,055.50
2. Dog Licensing Fines	\$5,750.00
3. ACO Fines	\$ 100.00
<u>Total</u>	<u>\$ 11,905.50</u>

In April, the ACO worked with the Hampstead Fire Dept. to sponsor a low cost rabies clinic. Over 100 animals were vaccinated and 10 animals were micro chipped.

The ACO Department continues to participate in regional disaster training and coordination through the NHDART (New Hampshire Disaster Animal Response Team) at no expense to the town. This year, ACO Johannesen helped set up and ran a pet friendly shelter during two different storms. Assistant ACO Brian Farrell and ACO Johannesen both attended NEACHA (New England Animal Control Humane Academy) where they were given training in animal control safety, gun identification safety, handling aggressive dogs, dealing with animal hoarding, handling farm animals and dealing with nuisance wildlife.

During Thanksgiving, someone abandoned a neutered male Maltese with a severely injured eye. When no one claimed the dog, ACO Johannesen reached out for donations through the media to have his eye repaired. We would like to thank all those donated and especially thank Dr. Brad Barnes and his staff at Edgefield Animal Hospital who performed the surgery. Donations paid for all medical and boarding bills. "Dually" was subsequently adopted and is now living a good life in his forever home.

RECREATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Hampstead Recreation Commission administers and supervises several recreation programs and all recreation facilities available to the citizens of Hampstead. Members include: Chairman Kim Colbert, Brian Goode, Dana D'Amico, Dano Anderson, alternate Tracey Flaherty and Angie Ingraham is the Recreation Director.

The summer program for children was our major yearly activity, involving approximately 270 children ages 5-13. The summer program is open to Kindergarten children thru Grade 8. Program sites were at the Memorial Gym and Hampstead Central School. We provide daily activities, sports, art and crafts and weekly fieldtrips. Some of the activities include: a pizza party, water and penny carnival, science day, build a bear day, and sports tournaments. There were trips to the Town Beach, as well as other exciting fieldtrips, such as roller-skating, bowling, Canobie Lake, Water Country, a day at the movies, Funtown Splashtown and more. We also added a field trip for the Kindergarten thru 4th Grade children to Cederland AMAZement Center Party Playland.

We also offer tennis and swimming. Tennis lessons are offered in three different time slots and ability. Swimming lessons start at age three with a beginner and intermediate class, which are taught at the Town Beach. A summer basketball program for children going into grades 6 through 12. We had one boys' league.

The Town Beach was a popular spot on the hot days. We're pleased to report that the weekly water testing showed that the water quality remained very good this summer. The HRC maintained and staffed the site from Memorial Day through the end of August. A beach parking permit continues to be required and is available at the Town Clerk's Office. Fees are five dollars for residents and twenty-five dollars for non-residents.

The HRC would like to send a special thank you to Cleta Barry and Ernie Tremblay for coordinating and planning all the trips for the Seniors Citizens. Some of the places they went included: Foxwoods, Bourne Scallop Festival, Mohegan Sun, and Fosters Clam Bake.

The Annual Senior Citizens' Holiday Dinner held in December was an enormous success and was attended by 300 Hampstead Seniors. The dinner was at the Granite Rose catered by Kieley Corporation and served by thirty wonderful community volunteers. Entertainment was provided by Cindi Verrill's choir group, which did an outstanding job singing holiday songs. Jim Stewart did an outstanding job as the MC and began the celebration with funny jokes. We extend our thanks to all who volunteered their time to help make the day an enjoyable success.

At Depot Road we cleared some land for the future Hampstead Skate Park along with other programs that can use the area. In the future, we anticipate completing

new projects that will benefit the Hampstead community.

RECYCLING AND WASTE DISPOSAL COMMITTEE

In 2011, trash collection and recycling in Hampstead have shown changes and improvements, which will continue into the new year. The final recycling and trash tonnage amounts were tallied and the committee is proud to say that the residents of Hampstead were able to decrease trash tonnage by 2.5% and increase recycling by 5.5%. The Town's recyclable rate is now up to 21 ½%. This is a testament of what you, the residents, have accomplished! The committee has pointed out in the past that an increase in the recycling tonnage avoids the cost of placing that tonnage in a landfill. Recycling not only saves valuable landfill space that has a positive impact on the overall environment. The committee can offer recycling programs but it is you that make them a success!

The town collects its recycling via a 'single stream' method. This program allows a resident to co-mingle their recycling and place them in one container.

If residents would like to use their own barrel (35 gallons or less) for placing their single stream recycling materials, stickers are available at the Town Office building that say "Recycling".

Finally, our town was chosen to represent New Hampshire in Recyclebank's "50 State Challenge" sponsored by SC Johnson. The program starts on Earth Day (April 22, 2012) and residents will be able to participate in the Recyclebank program at no charge for two years. Residents who recycle (and log their recycling participation with Recyclebank) will be eligible for Recyclebank rewards, which include coupons and gift certificates to local stores. More details will be announced in March.

In 2011, the Town Clerk-Tax Collector's office processed 11,581 motor vehicle and boat registrations, 1,593 dog licenses, 48 marriage licenses, 177 vital statistic certified copies, as well as hundreds of miscellaneous transactions. We have collected \$22,138,109 in property tax payments, which is 96% of the total property taxes committed.

We are working out the final details of getting property tax information on-line. You will soon be able to look at your property tax bill, current assessment, current balance, and payment history. Within our 2011 budget was a one-time fee to install an on-line tax payment system. Once installed, on-line tax payments can be made using a debit card, credit card, or an electronic check. There is a fee for this service, which is passed on to the individual taxpayer, at no cost to the Town. These start up funds have been encumbered, and the system should be up and running in early spring of 2012.

Our extended office hours, opening at 7:00 AM, has had a lot of positive feedback from our residents. We continue to adjust staff schedules creating no additional cost to the town for the extended service hours.

Our website, www.hampsteadnh.us, continues to be a great resource for information. Please visit it often, as it is continuously updated. Our policy has been and continues to be to provide exceptional service to the residents of Hampstead. We are always looking for new ideas and appreciate your feedback.

TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS - 2011

Trustees operate under statutory requirements dictated by the Division of Charitable Trusts, a unit of NH Department of Justice (DOJ), which is overseen by the Attorney General. The DOJ sets guidelines for the creation and management of charitable trusts including Cemetery Trusts and Capital Reserve Funds. Trustees are responsible for insuring the instructions for each Trust are dutifully followed as well as the investment of Funds managed and maintenance of Trust records.

Cemetery and High School funds have been under the management of North East Planning (LPL Financial) since 6/28/10 under the "Prudent Investor Rule". The investment objective for these funds is to achieve capital appreciation while simultaneously generating needed interest income for end of year distributions. The annualized return on these funds since inception is 2.66%. 2011 was a turbulent year for the market and the market value of Principal held declined by 0.91% negating the gains achieved in 2010. As of 12/31/11 net market loss to Principal since inception is \$105.32 (0.05%). While we did not achieve an appreciation in capital this year we did achieve interest/dividend income of 3.43% net of advisory fees.

While the desired investment objective for the Library and Park funds is the same as above, these funds continue to be held in CD's at TD Bank. The Library Funds currently enjoy an interest rate of 3.94% through 2013. The Park Funds while achieving sub-optimal interest rates require quick liquidity as funds may need to be withdrawn at any time for any amount. These funds will therefore continue to be invested under the Prudent Man rule. Note, all Capital Reserve Funds must be managed under the Prudent Man Rule and therefore remain in CD's. The average rate of return on all funds held in CD's was 0.62% (excluding Library Funds).

Of further note, the Martha Ordway Cemetery Trust has been added as a separate line item within Common Fund 1 on the Town Report and MS-10 Form. The reason for the itemization is that this Trust operates slightly differently than other Cemetery Trusts relative to how the interest may be utilized. The interest may be used for purposes the other Trusts do not allow for. Given these specifics we felt it important to itemize for clarity and awareness to future Trustees.

The following is a summary of annual year end distributions.

1. Library Funds: Interest income check for \$353.30 to Town of Hampstead Library (given to Emily Reschberger).
2. High School Fund: Interest income check for \$740.21 to Town of Hampstead School District (given to Laura Jones).
3. Cemetery Funds: Check for \$13,586.10 to Town of Hampstead (given to Harold Williams).

About the District:

The Southeastern New Hampshire Hazardous Materials Mutual Aid District's membership is comprised of 14 communities, covering of approximately 350 square miles with a population of over 175,000 people within the Route 93 corridor. In June the Town of Atkinson, Board of Selectmen voted to withdraw from membership of the District, reducing the membership to 14 communities. Essentially the District is bordered in the east by Route 125 and the Merrimack River to the west. North and south borders are defined by Manchester, Route 101 and the Massachusetts state line. The District was formed in 1993 to develop a regional approach in dealing with the increasing amounts of hazardous materials being used and transported within these communities. This District is recognized by the State of New Hampshire as the Regional Emergency Planning Committee (REPC) for the member communities. The REPC which consists of representatives from local government, industry, and the general public is working with industry to comply with federal regulations for the reporting of chemicals used within and traveling through the District.

The District draws its funding from an annual assessment from each community as well as from grants and donations. The 2011 operating budget for the District was \$112,156.00. Additionally, in 2011 the District applied for and received federal grants for equipment, training, and operational expenses totaling \$157,297.00. The Fire Chiefs from each of the member communities' make-up the Operations Committee of the District. This Operations Committee is overseen by a Board of Directors consisting of elected representatives from each community, who approve the budget and any changes to the bylaws. The Executive Board of the Operations Committee, which consists of the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Treasurer, Technician Team Liaison, and one Member at Large, manages the operations of the District within the approved budget. The District employs a part-time REPC Director to manage the administration functions of the District, including grants management, financial management, and emergency planning.

SOUTHEASTERN NEW HAMPSHIRE HAZARDOUS MATERIAL DISTRICT

The Emergency Response Team:

The District operates a technical emergency response team. This response team is overseen by one of the member community's Chief Fire Officer who serves in the Technical Team Liaison position. The team maintains a three level readiness response posture to permit it to immediately deploy an appropriate response to a District's community's request for help involving an unplanned release of potentially dangerous chemicals within their jurisdiction. While the team primarily prepares for response to unplanned accidental chemical releases it is also equipped and trained to deal with a variety of weapons of mass destruction (WMD) scenarios. The team maintains a host of specialized response equipment to deal with chemical and environmental emergencies.

The Emergency Response Team is made up of 32 members drawn from the ranks of the fire departments within the District. The team consists of 6 Technician Team Leaders, 18 Technician Level members, 5 Communication Specialists, and 3 Information Technology Specialists. In addition to members drawn from member fire departments, the team also includes members from various backgrounds that act as advisors to the team in their specific areas of expertise. These advisors include an industrial chemist, and several police officers.

The Team maintains a fleet of vehicles and specialized equipment with a value of approximately \$1,000,000. The vehicles consist of a mobile Command Support Unit, 2 Response Trucks, 2 Spill Trailers, a Technician Trailer and a Mobile Decontamination Trailer. With the use of State Homeland Security Program Grant funds this year we added an Operations Trailer which carries a large amount of spill containment equipment, including 1000 feet of floating containment booms, culvert and drain sealing bladders, a fuel transfer pump, and various absorbent materials. This mobile apparatus carries the team's equipment which includes chemical detection and identification instruments, containment supplies, plugging, patching and intervention supplies, communication equipment, computer based and other chemical reference guides as well as chemical protective equipment. The team equipment is store at various locations within the District, allowing for rapid deployment when the team is activated. Activation of the team is made by the request of the local incident commander through the Derry Fire Department Dispatch Center.

Response Team Training

In 2011 the Emergency Response Team completed 1516 hours of training, during monthly training drills and specialized classes attended by team members. This training included confined space entry, hazardous materials operations, Level A entry drills, radiation detection equipment operations, chemical identification, facility familiarization, transportation emergencies, Incident Command.

Additionally, in conjunction with the New Hampshire Fire Academy the District hosted a 24 hour Introduction to CAMEO (Computer Assisted Management of Emergency Operations) class, followed by a 16 hour Advanced CAMEO Class, instructors for these classes were provided by Louisiana State University, funding for our members to attend these classes was provided through a State Homeland Security Grant. The District also received Grant funding to hold Table Top and Functional Exercises for hazardous materials response.

The Team provided 39 hours of instruction to member fire departments, in various Hazardous Materials subjects, including on-scene operations and decontamination.

Emergency Responses

In 2011 the Team responded to 15 incidents within the District. These incidents included requests for technical assistance for member departments where a Response Team Leader provides consultation to the fire department on the handling of an incident. Additionally, team responses included hydrocarbon fuel spills in lakes, identifying spills of unknown substances, assisting the NH State Police Bomb Squad and the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency. The mobile command post was also used to support member departments during large scale incident.

ZONING BOARD

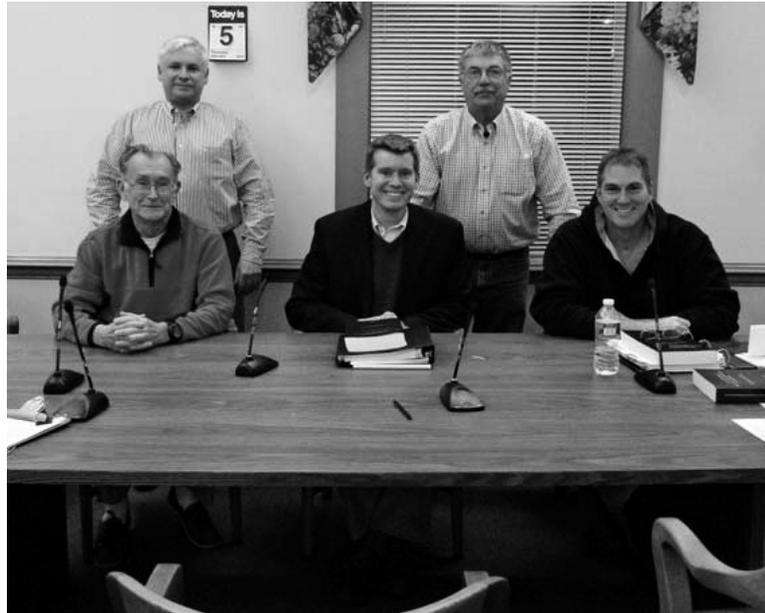
In 2011, the Hampstead Zoning Board of Adjustment heard a total of 34 requests, which represents a 150% increase from 2010. Of those requests, 16 were for special exceptions which were all granted. Two of the requests for special exceptions were for home occupations and four were for in-law apartments. 13 requests for variances were heard with 10 being granted and three denied. Two of the variances were for seasonal conversions and one was for a home occupation in the Recreational Zone. The Board also heard and granted one request for an Equitable Waiver of Dimensional Requirements and received two requests for rehearings, which were granted, resulting in rehearing which reversed the original decision.

The permanent members of the Board for 2011 were Kristin Yassenka (chairperson), Geoff Dowd (vice chairperson), Neil Emerson, Dale Blaine, and John Lisien. Don Reese was appointed as an alternative member this year, who serves with the other alternate Joe Guthrie. The Board continues to seek applications for more alternates.

The Board expresses its thanks and gratitude to our Recording Secretary, Dawn Shaw for her exemplary service and dedication.

The Hampstead School Board continues to support the staff and administration in their efforts to provide a curriculum which enables students to meet their needs for success in the twenty-first century.

Both the Central and Middle schools continue to excel in academic, athletic and cultural achievements.

Policies: The board continuously reviews existing policies and up-dates, revises or establishes new policies as needed.

Technology: Total integration of technology throughout the curriculum has been realized. The Technology Committee meets with the Technology Director to assure that all students and educators are equipped with appropriate technology materials.

Anti-Bullying Programs: The schools have implemented an outstanding program funded through the Olweus Grant. This program provides students the assurance that their safety and dignity will be secure at every level and in every instance. Students have taken initiatives to present plays, skits, songs and videos demonstrating the anti-bullying programs. Our students have visited neighboring schools to explain and

demonstrate the programs that have been successful in the Hampstead School District.

Pinkerton Academy: Students, teachers, administrators and school board members, as well as townspeople, have visited Pinkerton's new Freshman Academy. The Academy has welcomed visitors to tour the outstanding new building provided for the sending town's students. Hampstead's school board members continue to interact with Pinkerton's Board of Trustees in assuring us that the needs of all students are being met.

Students Involvement in Extended Learning Activities: Our schools can boast of winning results in many activities that go beyond basic academics. Our students have been winners in the Constitution Essay competition. Others have excelled in the Math Club competitions. Our Spanish students have travelled to Puerto Rico and have received accolades for their outstanding knowledge and involvement in the cultural life of that country. Still others have benefited from Project Respect, an ongoing program at the Middle School. Hampstead's Pinkerton students have been given countless awards upon

graduation. The Weather Station, dedicated to Jonathan Grassbaugh, is manned by students who record data and process weather phenomena information. These are but a few of the outstanding achievements our students have realized. The Hampstead School Board recognizes these achievements and in every instance supports these initiatives.

Community and Communication: The board gratefully accepts the generosity of Hampstead's Advisory Cable Committee. Their gracious donations have enabled the Middle School to move forward with their Channel 6 programming. This is an excellent example of community working cooperatively and collaboratively with the school district. Lori Collins, Technology Director, posts all school board meetings

on Vimeo, at the district's web site. This enables all interested townspeople to view the meetings at their leisure; as one of the continuing goals of the Hampstead School Board is to communicate intelligibly and transparently to all, this posting is of paramount importance.

It is with pride and confidence in the high quality of the Hampstead School District that we submit this annual report. The residents of Hampstead, and especially the parents, students, educators, and staff involved with its two schools on a daily basis, can look back on a



committee has begun to assess existing school library and media services at HCS and HMS. Likewise, the School Board has initiated an update of the mission, practices, and staffing patterns of the existing enrichment (“Ventures”) programs.

successful and inspiring year. Despite economic uncertainties on the local, state and national level, Hampstead voters overwhelmingly endorsed the proposed operating budget for the 2010-11 school year in March 2010. This has allowed the district to continue offering strong academic and extracurricular programs, supporting strategic goals in the areas of technology and facilities, and funding the excellent programs at Pinkerton Academy through tuition payments.

Over time, this effort will extend further into all main curriculum areas as New Hampshire, along with a majority of other states, has adopted the “Common Core” curriculum.

In the area of academics, both schools continued their focus on the instruction of mathematics through intensive professional development and analysis of effective teaching strategies. In the second, and final year, the ARRA (federal stimulus grant) funded math coach worked with teachers at all grade levels to remediate weaknesses and expand enrichment opportunities for all students in this subject. Inspired by early successes in math competitions, the HMS Math Club successfully challenged its members and other middle school teams in the area to higher and higher levels of performance. In keeping with the actions steps of the strategic plan, various subject areas and school programs are being reviewed with the goal of analyzing current practices and making recommendations for improvement if indicated. A study

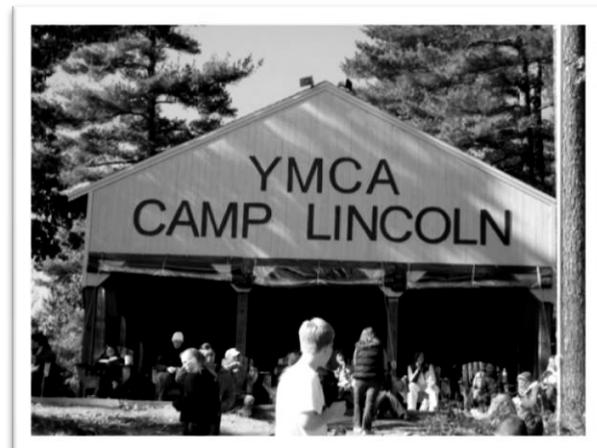
The latter half of 2010-11 school year was marked by a number legislative initiatives that significantly impacted the educational landscape and presented considerable challenges for the local School Board and community. In May 2011, the legislature’s refusal and inability to contribute the State’s share of the employer portion to the NH Retirement System suddenly created an unbudgeted liability for the local taxpayer in excess of \$340,000 long after the school budget had been approved. In the end, Hampstead was largely held harmless for one year through another round of federal stimulus funds, but future local budgets will have to make up what formerly had been a State responsibility. As of July 1, 2011, changes to the teacher tenure law now require new staff to complete five instead of three years of service before receiving “continuing contract” status. This creates an opportunity as well as an obligation for the district to provide additional professional development for new teachers before committing to offer them tenure. The recently revised mentoring

program and efforts to develop vibrant professional learning communities (PLCs) will assist new and veteran staff as well as school administration with meeting this challenging task.

With the hiring of a new Director of Technology, the district has made further strides in upgrading and expanding technology in the classroom. Server upgrades, virtualization, data protection, support for computer equipment purchases, along with intensified staff training in software applications will put the district in a solid position for meaningful integration of technology into the curriculum. Innovation and progress with cable TV programming in the school district has opened up new ways for students to share their learning with others and the community at large.

The installation of an emergency generator at the Central School at the beginning of the year has meant a major step forward in safeguarding the capital assets of the district. Both facilities now will remain protected in case of disruptions in the electric grid, and can maintain operations on an emergency basis. Throughout the year, the facilities staff have continued their important work on classroom renovations, electrical wiring upgrades, and annual building maintenance. The replacement of the domestic hot water system and much of the original kitchen equipment at HMS will provide future energy savings and improve efficiency.

In closing, we would like to express our appreciation for the diligence and dedication the Hampstead School Board demonstrates in working hard on behalf of all students in the school district. While acutely aware of the fiscal realities in the community, the members of the Board have taken on the challenge of providing the high quality education which the citizens of Hampstead have come to expect and rely on for their children.

During the school year 2010-11, we continued to see a few transitions in programs, while a few others evolved over the past few years. As always, our focus for these adaptations center on our school mission *to provide challenging education experiences that enable all students to succeed to their individual potential in a rapidly changing global community.*

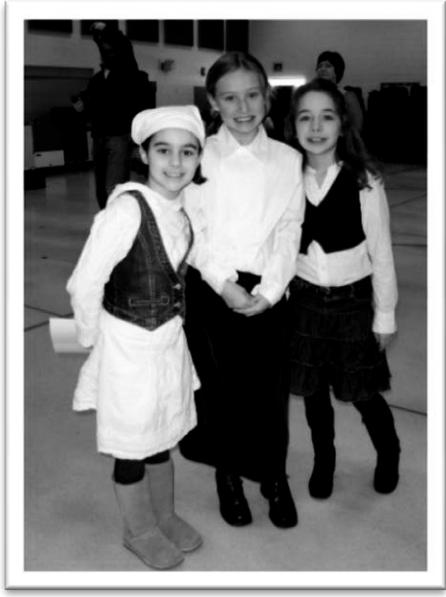


HCS significantly improved learning opportunities for children with a few changes over the past five years. The biggest change was the addition of public kindergarten in 2006, taking advantage of state funding and local support. A second major change is our school report card to a standards based model that is consistent throughout all HCS grade levels from preschool through grade four. Two other significant changes are found in Readiness and Response-To-Intervention (RTI).

- Public Kindergarten – The first group of public kindergarten students are now moving into their middle school years. Prior to 2006, we had students arriving in first grade from a dozen different preschool/kindergarten programs. We now find that 90% of HCS first graders have gone through HCS for their kindergarten

experience. The consistency of curriculum, instructional practices and assessment raised the academic preparedness that will carry forward into lifelong success.

- Report Card - We now have a few years with our standards based report card. We replaced a system of grade level report cards that change each year. Our new system improves the use technology and consistent standards assessments to improve the report of student growth.



- Readiness - The definition and need for the readiness gift of the year has evolved to a totally new design. We reduced the number of readiness placements significantly due to improved assessment and intervention possibilities for the students. We have a new model that has successfully addressed the gift of the year within our kindergarten and grade one classrooms.



- Response -To-Intervention (RTI) – The internal academic interventions at HCS evolved dramatically as we re-designed staffing, schedules and academic programs. These changes have improved the academic intervention possibilities for students that are developmentally appropriate yet academically challenging.

These changes are now producing results

that are setting the stage for a school that truly provides challenging education experiences that enable all students to succeed to their individual potential.

SCHOOL-WIDE NEWS & EVENTS

HCS Playground – In August of 2010, we opened the school year with an improved playground including new structures in the preschool area. There is also a new playground piece added to the larger elementary area along with ramps to provide improved accessibility. A portion of the funding was provided by the ARRA (American Recovery and Reinvestment Act) targeted to early childhood education. We especially thank the Hampstead Mothers' Club for their generous donation. These improvements will provide many years of safe play for the children of Hampstead.

NHPIE – The New Hampshire Partners in Education once again celebrated HCS along with most NH schools in the fall of 2010. HCS was honored with the Blue Ribbon Award, several Gold Circle Awards and the Power of the Penny Award.

- Blue Ribbon - HCS reached a significant NHPIE milestone in 2010. We received our 20th consecutive Blue Ribbon Award, recognizing excellence in parental involvement and volunteerism. This milestone is an important time to again say thanks to the thousands of volunteers at HCS for two decades of dedication for the children.

NEW HCS SKI CLUB - HCS students in 2010 were invited to join the first school ski club. The club was created to provide 3rd and 4th grade students an introduction to this great recreational sport at the McIntyre Ski Area. Special thanks go to the organizers of the club - HCS teachers, Michael Terrile and Angie Ingraham. Thanks also to the many parent volunteers and the staff at McIntyre that made the inaugural year a total success.

ARTIST IN RESIDENCE - Michael Gibbons spent a week at HCS as our artist in residence. Mr. Gibbons is a potter and former art teacher who owns Nutfield Pottery in Derry, NH. He demonstrated use of a pottery wheel to make various pieces. He worked with individual fourth grade classes to help them create their



own pottery piece. This was an excellent arts experience for all fourth graders.

ANTI-BULLYING EFFORTS - In 2010, the State of New Hampshire joined many other states by implementing a new, more strict anti-bullying law. As part of the law and subsequent work in Hampstead, we developed a new district policy and provided a significant amount of information to the community. Hampstead educators researched and shared a great deal of research and advice of how to respond to varying levels of bullying. This included parent information nights, guest speakers and program preparation. At the end of the school year, the HCS staff spent a few days and many hours with the internationally recognized Olweus program. Next year, we will present some of the positive results that are developing from the HCS Olweus effort. Special thanks go to the French Foundation for a significant grant to fully fund this work at HCS.

MULTICULTURAL SHOW - Fourth grade students participated in an amazing Multicultural Show in spring 2011. They studied, researched and presented regions of the world including Brazil, Thailand, Mexico, Austria, South Africa

and Greece. They demonstrated their learning of global understanding through video, dance, costume, song, artwork and food.

FIELD TRIPS - We expand the daily learning challenges with with many fascinating field trips throughout the region. Examples of recent trips include:

- NH history and landmarks: Strawberry Banke, NH State House & Museum and the Flume,
- Science adventures: Butterfly Place, Odiorne Point and Hampstead Conservation Trails
- Plays and musicals: Portsmouth Music Hall and the Capital Center for the Arts
- Sports and recreation: Water Safety lessons at Cedardale Athletic Facility and Bowling in Salem
- A virtual field trip to Plymouth Plantation

Again this year, I would like to thank the many volunteers in the community who supported the education of Hampstead students. This year our school was awarded our nineteenth Blue Ribbon Award for 7,843 volunteer hours. This is an outstanding accomplishment for a middle school!

Also, a special thanks to our Hampstead Police and Fire Departments for their continued work within the schools to promote safety and security for students and staff.

NELMS Spotlight School 2010-11

Hampstead Middle School continues to belong to a select number of other outstanding middle schools recognized by the New England League of Middle Schools as a Spotlight School. The purpose of the Spotlight School Award is to acknowledge schools that have a record of powerful learning for young adolescents and consistently observe middle school level best practices.

NECAP

This past year the Hampstead Middle School made Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) in the area of reading based on the results of the New England Common Assessment Program (NECAP). The school did not make AYP in the area of mathematics based on one subgroup not meeting the goal set by the State of New Hampshire. A committee of mathematics educators, administrators, and parents has been formed to look at best practices in the area of mathematics. HMS educators in every academic area will continue to improve our instructional program to meet the needs of our



students. (Please see the Assessment section for more information.)

Recognition for HMS Educators

Katie Wolff was recognized as the Hampstead Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) District Teacher of the Year. Katie then went on to win this award at the state level being named New Hampshire VFW Teacher of the Year. Katie was recognized for her work teaching students about civic responsibility and patriotism. Over the years Mrs. Wolff has sponsored essay and oratorical contests and organized class trips to political events including the presidential inauguration.

Congratulations are well deserved to Steve Ottaviani, Joann Erickson, Cressa Bonnell and Kathie Costa. All four HMS educators were honored at the New Hampshire Association of Middle Level Education annual dinner for their dedication to the middle school level child. All four received a certificate and recognition at the dinner.

Olweus Implemented at HMS

Hampstead Middle School implemented a nationally recognized and renowned anti-bullying program, titled Olweus during the 2010-2011 school year. This program was fully funded through a Strategic Prevention Framework (SPF) grant from the State of New Hampshire. The website states, "The Olweus *Bullying Prevention Program* is designed to improve peer relations and make schools safer, more positive places for students to learn and develop. Goals of the program include reducing existing bullying problems among students, preventing new bullying problems and achieving better peer relations at school." As part of the program a committee of administrators, guidance counselors, teachers, paraprofessionals, bus drivers, and

parents met over the summer of 2010 to receive training and plan the roll-out of the new program at a school and community level. The whole staff was then trained in bullying intervention as well as bullying prevention. The most important facet of the program is the education of the students. During their advisory period, HMS students learned about bullying and their role in bullying prevention. As a school we have learned the importance of caring for one another and how to create a sustainable community of learners.

Hampstead School District Cable Television is a Reality

The Hampstead School District Cable TV Station made major headway this year spurred on by a donation by the Cable Advisory Committee of a Tightrope Video Server. Both district schools are now able to broadcast bulletin board announcements, graduations, concerts and other related activities on local cable Channel 6. Residences serviced by Comcast are able to receive this channel and benefit from local educational news. The town furthered their association with the schools by inducting the school technology director as a member of the Cable Advisory Board. The two entities are continuing to work together to produce local programming such as *Chatting with Your Legislator*, featuring New Hampshire House Representative, Regina Birdsell as well as educational programming for both schools.

The Hampstead School District Technology Summer Camps were well received during the summer of 2011. By attending these camps held at the middle school, over 55 students were able to extend their knowledge of robotics, video, animation and forensics.

Hampstead Spanish Language Students Visit Puerto Rico

Students from the 7th and 8th grade Spanish classes at Hampstead Middle School had a chance to practice their

Spanish and see Hispanic culture first-hand during a trip to Puerto Rico last April. Ten students and eleven adults travelled to the island where they spent 8 days exploring the history, geography, and culture of this fascinating part of the United States. Richard La Salle, Superintendent of Schools, whose family spent many years living on the island when he was a child, accompanied and assisted in guiding the group. The students and parents enjoyed sharing adventures including hiking in the rain forest of El Yunque, kayaking at night in the bio-luminescent waters of Fajardo, exploring the ancient Spanish fortress of El Morro, and of course, swimming in the warm waters of the Caribbean Sea. Trips by Hampstead Middle School Spanish students have been an annual event organized by Spanish teacher Carol Randall. These trips have been partially funded by generous contributions from the restaurant and business community including funds raised through the "Taste of the Town" events, also organized by Mrs. Randall.

Hampstead Middle School Athletics

The Hampstead Middle School athletic teams had a great year during the 2010-2011 school year. Some major milestones for the year were winning multiple championships, setting a league record, and, as always, welcoming new players and coaches to the program. The boys' soccer and baseball teams won the Tri-County Class "M" Championship with the boys' basketball team the Class "M" runner-up, losing in the championship game. Girls' and boys' track teams both took first place with outstanding performances in all events. The golf team also won the Tri-County Championship adding themselves to the long line of HMS championship teams. Perhaps the greatest feat of the year was the boys' soccer team having an undefeated season with no goals scored against them all season. This was a tri-county league record. As a school we are proud of the

championships, but are prouder still of the class and dignity with which our athletes carry themselves throughout the sports season. Thank you to all our athletes, coaches, and parents for all their hard work and effort during the 2010-2011 athletic season.

The Arts at HMS

The HMS Music Department had a very successful 2010-2011 school year. The general music program continued to thrive in all grades. The instrumental and chorals programs also saw another year of solid growth and improvement presenting concerts in December and May. The HMS choruses sang the National Anthem at both Manchester Monarchs and New Hampshire Fisher Cats games. The HMS 7th and 8th grade band and chorus both participated in the NH Music Educators’ Association Large Group Festival in March, the largest and most prestigious festival for school music groups in the state. Both received strong ratings and great comments from the judges. The HMS Jazz Band and Select Chorus joined the 7th and 8th grade ensembles at the Great East Festival in June and all groups received Gold Medal ratings at the festival. HMS was also represented by 12 musicians at the NH Music Educators’ Association Southeast District Festival held at Greenland Central School. The HMS music department looks forward to another successful year and hopes to continue with the strong reputation it has established.

The annual musical theatre production (2011) was You’re a Good Man, Charlie Brown which involved some 82 students in cast and crew and countless adult volunteers from the community. The plotline is empathetically concerned with the trials and joys of an American childhood as seen through the eyes of crabby Lucy, Linus and his blanket, Schroeder’s passion for the piano and, of course, the resident beagle “Snoopy” who dispenses wisdom from the roof of his



doghouse where he is usually found lounging. Our seniors thoroughly enjoyed the special performance that kicked off the season run.

ASSESSMENT

Beginning in October 2005, students in grades 3-8 are assessed annually in the areas of reading and mathematics through the New England Common Assessment Program (NECAP); writing is assessed only in grades 5 and 8, though students were not assessed in writing in October 2009. Beginning in May 2008, grades 4 and 8 are annually assessed in science. The NECAP was designed to measure specific Grade Level Expectations with the results disaggregated by the following subgroups:

- All Students
- Major racial and ethnic groups (if there is a minimum of 10 students)
- Students with disabilities (if there is a minimum of 10 students)
- Limited English proficient (if there is a minimum of 10 students)
- Economically disadvantaged (if there is a minimum of 10 students)
- Migrant (if there is a minimum of 10 students)
- Gender

PINKERTON ACADEMY

Mary Anderson, Head of School

As a comprehensive secondary school, Pinkerton Academy focuses on providing quality education for all students. Pinkerton's broad high school program addresses opportunities for college, trade careers and the military as young people have very different interests in academics, extracurricular activity, career and technical education and other subjects leading to their individual futures.



Overview: 2010-2011 School Year

Construction of the Academy Building marked the year's single most-visible activity at Pinkerton. On-time and on-budget, work continued for a new facility to replace long out-of-date "portable" classrooms that remained on campus for 40 years. The Academy Building was conceived as a learning center with emphasis on transition for freshmen as well as resources for all students including Computer Labs, Media Center, Math classrooms and Career and Technical Education.

For the first time, Pinkerton graduation was held at the Verizon Wireless Center in Manchester.

In the summer of 2010, Pinkerton was awarded a full 10-year reaccreditation from the New England Association of Schools and Colleges.

Status Report: 2011-2012 School Year

The Academy Building opened in September 2011 to give freshmen a new teaching model and facility targeted to their high school transition. Core academics for freshmen are taught in the Academy Building and a team model closely monitors each freshman. The Freshmen Cafeteria allows appropriate socialization for these first-year Pinkerton students. For all class years, the Academy Building offers facilities including Culinary Arts, Health Science Technology, Lecture Hall, Media Center, Special Education, TV Production, Video Production, and Writing Center.

Two Pinkerton teachers were recognized for excellence in teaching:

- Lani Buskey was presented the *Excellence in Teaching Award* by the New England Association of Teachers of English.
- Toby Frank was honored as New Hampshire's *World Language Teacher of Excellence* by the NH World Language Teachers Association.

Ed Gerety, nationally-recognized motivational speaker, addressed all Pinkerton students in the fall with a transformational and inspiring message of respect, self-awareness and school climate.

Achievement of Hampstead Students at Pinkerton

Hampstead and East Hampstead students are extremely well represented at Pinkerton in categories of Class Rankings, Honor Societies, Individual Awards, Group Achievements, Career and Technical Education, Performance Arts, Athletics and other interests.

Academics

Budget for 2012-2013 School Year

Pinkerton's financial goal is to provide great educational value while addressing local and state economic challenges and the standard of education expected of the Academy.

- For 2012-13, the Board of Trustees at Pinkerton has set an overall budget \$35.4 million, an increase of 1.52% over the 2011-12 budget.
- Tuition for Regular Education students in the academic year 2012-13 is \$10,015.79 or 3.12% over 2011-12 tuition, an increase of \$303.41 per student.

To accomplish the new budget, no new courses will be offered in the 2012-13 academic year. Also, Pinkerton has elected to defer certain capital expenses unrelated to safety issues, discontinue Driver Education, decrease the long range technology fund and secure revenue from outside parties for athletic and other

public events. A health benefit increase of 6.5% constitutes one of the more significant cost impacts on the 2012-13 budget.

The budget increase of about one-and-a-half percent is offset by a projected decrease in enrollment of 40 students for 2012-13, bringing total projected enrollment to 3,060 students. With an eye on trends affecting present and future enrollment and cost, Pinkerton will continue to anticipate opportunities for savings and greater efficiency.
